Reminders for revising a draft...

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- 1. Look over your second draft first and the suggestions you received in conference circle.
- 2. Make decisions about where you will make changes. Mark them on your second draft.
- 3. If needed, use colored pencils to help you organize your story.
- 4. As you begin to write your third draft, be sure to start with a TITLE.
- 5. Skip lines, leaving room for editing.
- 6. Make changes you see are needed as you go.
- 7. If you see spelling mistakes, fix them.
- 8. Check for capital letters, punctuation, and grammar errors. Fix them as best you can.

Questions to consider as I write a revised draft:

Look at the questions your writing group gave you. In addition, YOU need to be thinking about how you feel the story can be improved.

ADD:

- What important details do I need to add to my story or essay? If I haven't completed a mental picture for the reader, what can I add to make the picture clearer?
- ~ Do I have an ending? Am I happy with my ending or can it be improved?
- ~ Are any words or transitions missing?
- Are there any quotes that would make my story or essay clearer or more powerful?
- ~ Should I add data or facts or stories to make my point?

SUBTRACT.

- ~ What parts of the story or essay can I take out? What details don't really matter or are a part of another story or essay I can write later?
- Is the reader ready for the quote or facts? Should I take them out or move them?

REARRANGE:

- ~ What word, sentences, or paragraphs are out of order?
- ~ Have I clearly shown where the parts of my story or essay are by indenting paragraphs for the reader?
- ~ Am I happy with my lead or can it be improved?
- ~ Is each word choice the best choice?
- ~ Would my story be better with more action words?
- ~ Have I clearly defined people/places and objects by using specific nouns and NOT pronouns?

COMBINE:

- ~ Which sentences can be put together?
- ~ Have I used some short sentences and some complex sentences for variety?
